Federal Gas Tax Holiday? YGTBK!

President Biden now wants Congress to enact a federal gas tax holiday. The good news is that it calls attention to why "freeways" are not free. The bad news is that it will, at best, give a pittance to motorists and make a bad problem worse.

Federal gas tax holiday – what that would mean

About electric cars

So we're still back to conventional vehicles, and this federal gas tax holiday. When Biden even talks about a thing like this, he shows weakness.

Republicans know it. Senator Roger Wicker (R-Miss.) reminds us that he blamed Vladimir Putin, then our own energy producers. (How he can do that with a straight face, after he curtailed those same producers, is beyond my comprehension.) Senator Wicker finishes by calling this federal gas tax holiday what it is: a cheap gimmick.
